FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Rather than write an account of an interesting historical feature of the New Italy story, I thought that a timely reality check of present and future developments is appropriate.

Visitor Numbers: During the recent December/January holiday period of 62 days, the site recorded an astonishing total of 62,101 visitors – a daily average of 1,001 persons! This compares with 616 persons/day when recordings were first made in December 2009/January 2010.

The annual daily average is currently approx. 600 persons/day, compared to 335 persons/day in 2009. While this patronage growth is gratifying, it does clearly spell the need for us to be prepared to satisfy the needs of New Italy's future growth - in all areas of our activities.

Highway Upgrade: This appears to be on schedule and it is due for completion in late 2020. It will have considerable positive influences on our visitor numbers because

1. The toileted rest stop (northern lane) to the immediate south has been permanently closed
2. Woodburn, Broadwater and Wardell will be bypassed.
3. New Italy will be the only flush toileted 24/7 rest stop on the 90km stretch between Ballina and Maclean.

In consideration of the disruption caused by roadworks at our site, the RMS is shortly to construct a 120 space "temporary" unsurfaced car park at the rear of the complex. This will remain in use when the front car park is rebuilt.

The arrangement is that we pay for the design and development approval costs (approx \$40,000) and the RMS pay for the construction (approx. \$350,000).

Development approval for this project and associated works (including a pathway to the buildings and an emergency and heavy vehicle lay over area on Swan Bay Road) has been received. Additionally one of the RMS sub-contractors (CPB) is to construct a temporary administration office on a southern section of the Park of Peace (2 year occupancy). This will be paid for in cash and kind directed towards the above improvements. Meanwhile tree clearance is well underway in our immediate neighbourhood.

The Future: Growth over the past few years has put pressure on all our facilities, volunteers workload and various site attractions. To date these challenging tasks has been dealt with and attained as we set about improving the Pavilion, Gift Shop, Museum/Café and the grounds.

However, to cater for future expected patronage growth, considerable expense is expected (within 3 -5 years) for a new toilet block, treatment system and additional water storage.

Also a place such as ours would welcome a children's playground, a dog exercise area and perhaps an electric car recharge station.

Anticipated growth will need to be planned and carefully managed in a manner that combines the current ethos of New Italy while meeting contemporary community expectations in a higher volume setting, as we justifiably make some money from our investments.

High on the priority list when the highway works are completed is the refurbishment of the eastern (highway side) facade of the complex. This overdue makeover will update our appearance (while being sensitive to New Italy's heritage) and hopefully increase visitor numbers.

Also to be considered is the future management structure and governance of New Italy. In circumstances of declining and ageing volunteers, is the current structure suitable for the future? We must plan towards a sustainable and manageable future and in a professional manner. No longer can we rely on willing but ageing volunteer tradespeople, second hand materials or short term planning. To maintain a quality experience, we need to employ competence and vision. This requires a bigger budget and good planning. As members with connections to the site, your suggestions and input are encouraged and welcome.

Footnote: During the fore-mentioned holiday period, a total of \$6,118 was contributed to on-site donation boxes. Considering 62,101 visitors during this period, the donation rate averaged 10c/person/day! You would think the combined efforts and achievements of many volunteers over the past 30 years would be worth more than 10c per visit.

CENTENARY OF ANZAC

Last year was the centenary of the deaths on the Western Front of two young men from the Italian families that settled New Italy. Pte John Caminiti, 36th Aust Inf Bn was killed in action on 10 June 1917, and Gunner Lorenzo Nardi, 4th Aust Div Ammunition Column died of wounds on 22 August 1917. This year is the centenary of the cessation of hostilities in WW1, but it also the centenary of the deaths of several other soldiers who had a connection to the New Italy settlement.

STANLEY MORROW was the teacher at the New Italy school throughout 1915. He enlisted on 19 June 1916 and joined the 57th Aust Inf Bn in France. Stanley was killed in action on 18 August 1918 just south of the Somme River in the vicinity of Mericourt and Proyart. Cpl Stanley Morrow is buried at Mericourt L'Abbe Cemetery. He was 36 and married with 2 children.

LIONEL PINCHIN was a 16 year old pupil teacher at the New Italy school in 1902. When he enlisted on 24 July 1916 – at age 30 - he was married and working as a school teacher. Lionel joined the 53rd Aust Inf Bn on the Western front on 21 October 1917 and was killed in action on 1 September 1918. Pte Lionel Pinchin is buried at Peronne.

LT-COL JOHN MILNE DSO was John Caminiti's Commanding Officer in the 36th Aust Inf Bn. Notwithstanding the large losses to his Bn in the action when John Caminiti was killed, he still found time to pen a personal letter about John's death to Millicent Archer, John's defacto wife in Sydney. John Milne, who was in the 1st wave of landings at Gallipoli on 25 April 1915, was himself killed in action on 12 April 1918.

CHRISTIAN PETERSEN was another pupil teacher at the New Italy school who served in France. He was 30 and working as a teacher when he enlisted in January 1917. As part of the 17th Aust Inf Bn, Christian was twice wounded in action and returned to Australia as an invalid on 27 February 1919.

MUSEUM UPGRADE UPDATE ... MARCH 2018

We look forward to sharing the work done so far in the New Italy Museum at the upcoming Anniversary Day. While work is ongoing, we hope you enjoy the story as it is unfolding around the walls of the refurbished Museum building.

We are also very excited about a significant new donation to the Museum collection. This is the historic Tome Rifle that was owned by Girolamo Giovanni Tome of Orsago, Italy. Girolamo, his wife Luvigia and their 5 surviving children, were on the Marquis De Ray's expedition of 1880-1881. The family story is that the rifle was used by Girolamo Giovanni Tome at the Battle of Solferino on 24 June 1859. The rifle was passed to Nicholas John Catlan (previously Catalano), great-grandson of Girolamo. Nick who passed away on 1/12/2017 aged 83, was a keen supporter of the New Italy Museum, so the family thought it was very fitting to donate Girolamo's rifle to our Museum for its display. We thank Belinda Patterson née Catlan and family for their generosity.
