FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As our readers and members would be aware our signature event *Carnevale Italiano* was cancelled in April 2017 because of the devastating regional floods. Then when considering a 2018 event we were advised by the Roads and Maritime Services that access to the site would be problematic because of highway construction activities.

With this in mind it was decided to scale down the size of the function from a district attraction to a minor local affair to celebrate New Italy's Anniversary Day. As it happened we enjoyed a very relaxed and successful mini anniversary that was attended by about 200 people.

This smaller event reduced overheads for traffic control, equipment hire and entertainment and so on. Also eliminated was the enormous personal safety and financial risk of staging the large and ever-expanding traditional event that has been Carnevale Italiano at the New Italy Museum site. However when the new car park goes in, and with the other changes that will go with the new car park, the site will be better prepared to cater for a large event.

The traditional Carnevale placed an enormous physical workload on our ageing volunteers. Without an injection of more volunteers, NIMI will struggle to hold a large Carnevale the current situation is not tenable.

The success of our mini Carnevale or the 2018 Anniversary Day both socially and financially, has been reinforced by a recent second function.

Here I am referring to the Italian fashion parade organised by the New Italy Casa Vecchia Gift Shop held in our hall on Saturday 22nd April. This function, attended by some 110 visitors (mainly women), was an outstanding example of just what can be done with our existing facilities without the risk of over stretching our resources through a lack of labour, congested parking, overcrowding and the mistakes that can happen with larger functions. This event was successful in many ways - also a great advertisement for New Italy and its dynamic gift shop.

The organising committee of women is to be commended for its initiative and, may I say, professionalism: Milan here we come!

The success of these two smaller functions has set us thinking that this could well be the way of the future, i.e. less = more. Smaller functions - more often. This new approach will have a strong influence on future events at the New Italy site.

Finally I report that at our May NIMI committee meeting a list of priority projects was compiled. Head of the list is a new sewerage treatment system to replace the existing grossly undercapacity facility that is little more than a domestic size.

The decision was further influenced by the proximity of the new car park (western side) to the sewerage irrigation area and the need to eliminate offensive smells in this locality – which is the case at the moment. Other items on the "to do" priority list (in approximate order of preference) are the Swan Bay Road layover, a lit pathway from the western car park, the enhancement of the site's eastern façade, an investigation into the establishment of an electric car charging station and the addition of solar power, a new kitchen in the hall, the development of the gifted 2 hectare area to the south of the complex and a children's playground.

It is plain to see from the above list, that our success is coming at a price.

THE 'INDIA': A VESSEL UNFIT FOR PURPOSE

The story of the Italian immigrants who survived the ill-fated Marquis De Rays' expedition and eventually settled New Italy is well known. However little is known of the ship, the "India", that transported them from Barcelona to Port Breton in New Ireland, and then on to Noumea.

There are no photos of the "India" that would allow us to get a sense of what it would have been like to be aboard. What is known is that it was a ship powered by steam engines that drove a propeller –i.e. not a paddle steamer. There are differing accounts of the size of the vessel. A contemporary newspaper article refers to the vessel being "900 tons", whereas an article published in 2011 refers to the vessel being of "445 tons" [Metcalf, Bill. Utopian Fraud: The Marquis de Rays and La Nouvelle-France. Griffith University: Society of Utopian Studies, 2011]

Lloyds Register of Shipping has details of several vessels named "India". The ship in the register that is most likely to have been the vessel acquired by the Marquis for the expedition is described as being of iron construction, built at Dumberton in the UK in 1862, 1039 gross tons, 239 feet long with 2 decks and powered by 2 steam engines producing 142 horse power. The ship's owner in 1875 was the British India Steam Navigation Company and

a contemporary account of the "India" arriving in Noumea on 12 March 1881 refers to the ship being "... proved to be the British India Steam Navigation Company's India ...".

The "India" left Barcelona in July 1880 with 339 immigrants aboard. It seems to have been well provisioned, although conditions on board would have been cramped and conducive to the spread of illness. Notwithstanding the 10 deaths that occurred while still in the Mediterranean Sea, the voyage via the Suez Canal, Sri Lanka and Singapore to New Ireland was described as "without incident".

The metal hulled vessel with its steam engines would have required continual attention to counter the effects of sea water corrosion. This attention would not have occurred – when the decision was taken in February 1881 to leave Port Breton for Noumea the engines failed and continued to fail causing the short journey to take almost 3 weeks. On approach to Noumea, the engines again failed and the "India" was at risk of being wrecked on a reef – only a "fortuitous breeze" saved the vessel.

"India" was in such poor condition that it was incapable of being sailed to Sydney. It was eventually sold for scrap to redeem some of the costs incurred in Noumea.

Families caught up with each other and enjoyed all the recent changes that have happened at Historic New Italy. As well it was great opportunity to renew memberships and do some retail therapy at the Gift Shop!

We are very pleased to report that we are up to stage 5 on our Upgrade Plan. A full version of this plan will be available on both our website and Facebook pages. Stage 5 includes the development of the Community, the School, the Church, the New Italy ANZACS and Remembering New Italy displays. We also await the outcome of our grant application for a heritage fabric display cabinet from Museums and Galleries. This cabinet will be purpose built locally and be able to house our precious silk and other heritage fabrics isafely in the midst of the Museum layout.
